



project update

With all the existing plantings around the Ovens-Buckland (stages 1 & 2) and Germantown Streamside Reserve growing so well there continues to be a need to keep up with site

maintenance; removing and/or straightening guards, weeding, spraying and replacing dead trees.

Bushfire Recovery; Threatened Species: Bec (Alpine Nursery) reports there has also been excellent germination of the Omeo Gum seeds collected by the UOVLG in the Upper Buckland last autumn.

2022 will see quite a lot of work around weed control and Omeo Gum seedling planting around Beveridge's Station (Upper Buckland) where this rare species grows.



We are also hopeful that our Threatened Species and Fire Community Event will also be rescheduled in 2022 after the fire season.

A number of grant applications have been successful allowing for another 3 exciting new projects to go ahead with the assistance of a paid project officer:

Ovens Buckland Stage 3 will continue weed control and restoration near Ovens/Buckland Rivers confluence with the involvement of the Porepunkah Primary School in Junior Landcare and planting along the Ovens River adjacent to the school 'plantation' site.

Murray Darling Healthy Rivers will involve weed control (contract) and new plantings between Bright and Germantown.

Living with Deer will involve UOVLG working with landowners (rural and town) learning how to reduce the impacts of feral deer. We will run field days with experts on a range of topics.

We acknowledge the Taungurung and Dhudhuroa Traditional Custodians of the land on which we work and learn and pay our respects to their Elders past, present and emerging.

floods, storms and an earthquake!

We may not have been at the epicentre but we certainly felt it!

At magnitude 5.9, Geoscience Australia said this is the biggest earthquake to hit Victoria in the modern instrumental era (post 1900), and probably since European settlement. "The Australian plate is the fastest moving continental land mass on Earth and is colliding into the Pacific plate to the north and east, and the Eurasian Plate to the northwest.

This generates compressive stress in the interior of the Australian continent. Earthquakes are caused by the sudden release of this stress when rocks deep underground break and move along a fault line.

The Rawson earthquake occurred in Australia's South-East Highlands region, which has a relatively high level of seismic activity and was felt across four states."

An egg puzzle? In early September 2 eggs were found high up on a dry northern ridge of candlebark (hollows) and peppermint forest a long way from water, in Mt Buffalo NP. The eggs were white with some mottled markings about the size of a small duck egg.

Some ideas are: Wood Duck (no creek or river close by), YTB Cockatoo (too early in season), Little Eagle (uncommon), Powerful Owl (uncommon), & White-throated Nightjar (ground nester).

Any more ideas?





Jenvey's From Landcare Committee member Rob Duncan (August 2021)

The HVP replanting appears finished, more than 50 well started new trees (Manna Gum, Mountain Swamp Gum, Apple Box) planted into augured pits in the dredged rocky alluvium and soil added. Cylindrical, rabbit wire netting deer-guards 1.8m high supported by three steel stakes protect all new trees.

The original poisoned trees have been felled and a few vigorously coppicing lignotubers retained. The recent wet weather has encouraged immediate fresh growth of the trees, and given a benign summer season the area will be soon restored and enhanced.

Considerable labour, effort and materials have gone into the remediation work following accidental poisoning of landcare plantings. The cost to HVP must have been significant and the Company should be commended.


